## Making Honey Flapjacks



This week in their Cookery lesson, Comet Class worked on making honey flapjacks. The pupils were supported to follow the recipe step-by-step and were each given the responsibility of helping their key staff weigh out the oats, sugar, and butter. This provided a great opportunity to practise early measurement skills and engage in purposeful, hands-on learning.

Once the ingredients were prepared, the pupils independently mixed everything together in a bowl using a spatula. This task encouraged them to explore and develop their complex dexterity and fine motor skills, as they stirred, folded, and combined the mixture with increasing confidence. Staff observed strong engagement and enjoyment throughout the activity.

The highlight for many was tasting the honey, which they found exciting and motivating. After the flapjacks were baked and cooled, the pupils were proud to take their own portion home to enjoy as a sweet snack after school. Overall, it was a successful and sensory-rich cookery session that supported independence, practical skill-building, and confidence in the kitchen.

In Maths, the children have been exploring data and division. To help them understand how to collect and interpret information, they went on a trip to the staff car park. There, they carefully observed and recorded how many cars of each colour they could see.

Back in the classroom, they used this information to create their own bar graphs, helping them to visualise and compare the data they had collected.

As part of their work on division, the class have been learning how to divide by two. They have been practising sharing objects into equal groups and understanding how division can be used in everyday situations.

In English, Sun Class have been focusing on instructions. They had lots of fun playing “Simon Says,” which helped them practise listening carefully and following instructions accurately. They have also been reading and writing their own sets of instructions, including how to make a jam sandwich. This has helped them to think about clear, step-by-step language and the importance of being precise so others can follow their directions successfully.

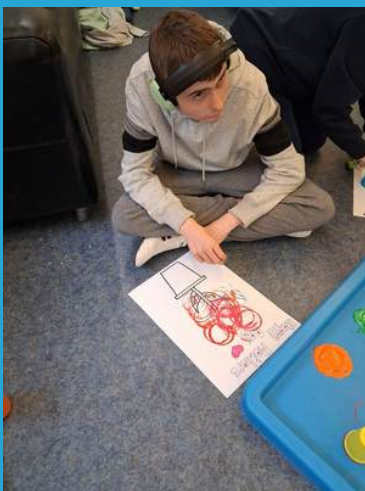
This week in topic lesson comet class were learning about the historical origins of the great wall of China and why it was built, to understand the overall history of china by watching a slideshow on this subject.

Zak researched and presented about welding career, and he pointed out that one does not need a degree to be a Welder. The teacher pointed out that welding is a particularly good profession and that there are apprentices for submarine building and that one can do a level 1 to level 3 course or get an apprenticeship. One of the most paying welding jobs is underwater welding.

Ben researched and presented on working as a Cinema usher. Ben described that the work would involve showing the customers their sits and cleaning the theatres. Ben said that one can get into this career by either getting an apprenticeship or applying directly to the cinema theatre for a job.

Ocean researched and presented on architectural technician as a career interest. Ocean provided feedback to the group that this career will involve drawing plans of builds and structures using ICT software called CAD which stands for computer aided design. The discussion revealed that CAD is used for drawing single buildings to plans of towns and can model how the city will fit in the environment and an assessment of potential environmental impact.

## Class 3 - Exploring Monet Through Water Lilies

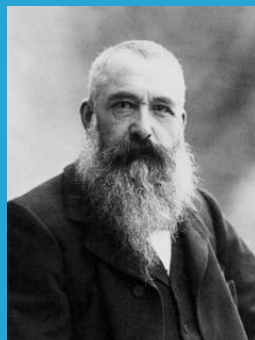
In their art lessons this term, Class 3 learners have been learning about the famous artist Claude Monet and his influential role in the Impressionist movement. They have explored who Monet was, where he lived and worked, and how he used colour, light and texture to capture moments in nature rather than painting fine details.



The learners focused primarily on Monet's well-known Water Lilies paintings, discussing how he was inspired by his garden and pond and how the same subject could look different depending on the time of day, light or mood. They looked closely at the brushstrokes, colour choices and layering used in his work, noticing how the paintings feel calm, expressive and full of movement.

Using this inspiration, Class 3 then created their own versions of Monet's water lilies. They experimented with both pen and paint techniques, blending colours, layering brushstrokes and using different tools to create texture on the page. Learners were encouraged to work freely and expressively, just as Monet did, rather than aiming for perfection.

The finished pieces are vibrant and individual, with each learner interpreting the water lilies in their own way. The project has helped to build confidence, creativity and an understanding of how art can be inspired by famous artists while still allowing room for personal expression. Staff are extremely proud of the effort and imagination shown by Class 3 throughout the lessons, and the artwork produced has been a wonderful celebration of learning through creativity.



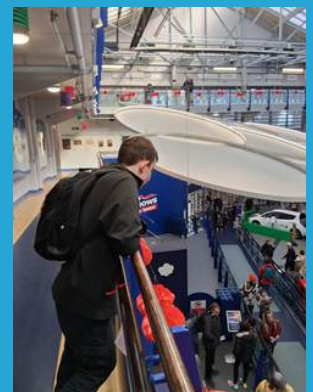

## Class 2's Trip to the Hancock Museum

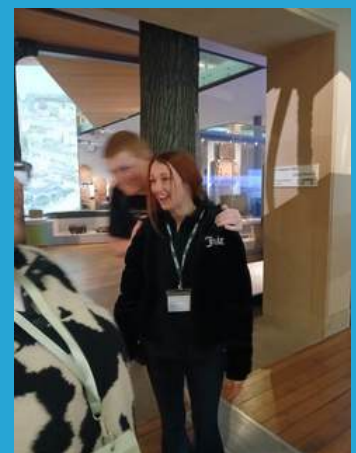

- **Rigging:** is the process of adding a skeleton to the model so it can move in a realistic way.

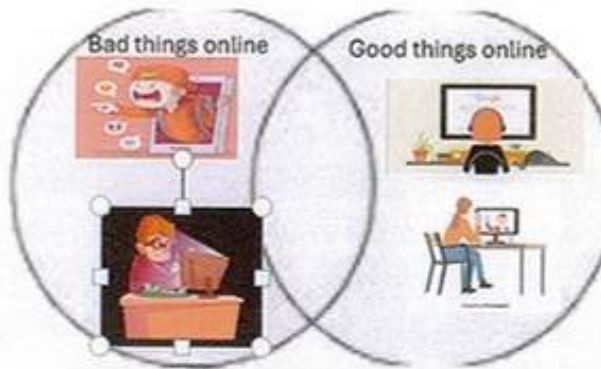
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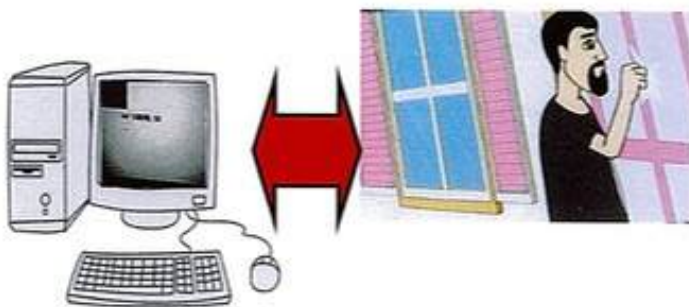


### Being safe online

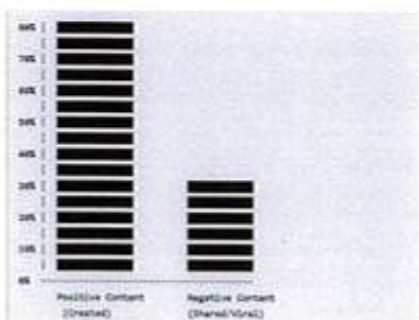

If you were sharing personal details make sure not on a fake website where scammers are trying to trick you because they can when they have your name and address they can knock on your door and maybe ask for thing of you.

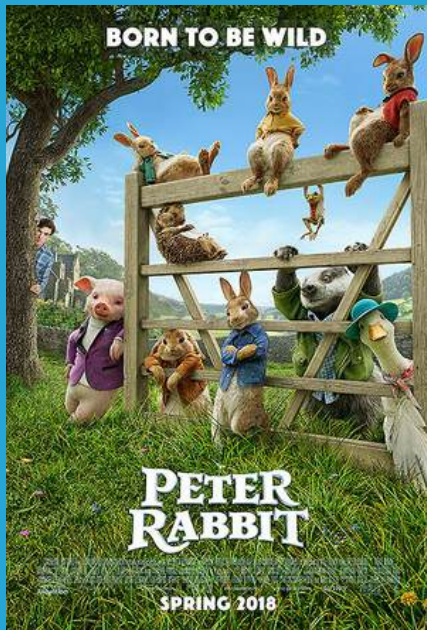


This bar chart shows how many bad things that can happen and how many good things can happen

Overall, Peter Rabbit is a lively and funny movie with plenty of action and humour. It's a great choice if you want something easy to watch and entertaining.

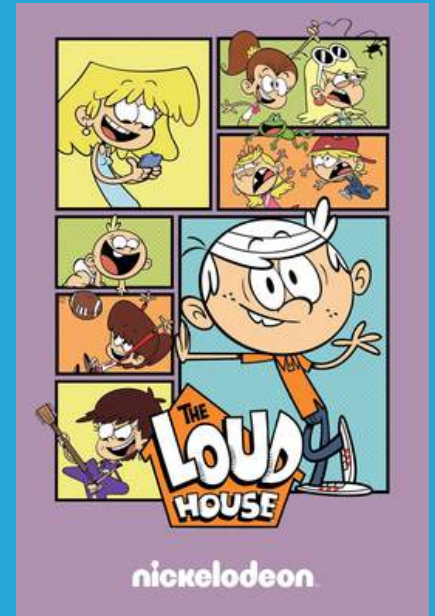


# Review - TV Show

If you think your house is noisy, The Loud House will make yours seem calm. Created by Chris Savino, the show follows Lincoln Loud, the only boy in a family with ten sisters—so life is always chaotic.

Each sister has a completely different personality, which keeps things interesting and often leads to arguments, funny moments, and unexpected problems. Lincoln is always coming up with plans to manage the chaos, but they don't usually go the way he hopes.



The show is really relatable, even if you don't have a big family. It captures everyday situations like sibling rivalry and trying to get attention, just in a more exaggerated and fun way. The humour is one of the best parts, with lots of quick jokes and entertaining scenes.

Although it's mostly light and funny, the episodes often include messages about teamwork, honesty, and understanding others. Sometimes the plots can feel a bit predictable, but they're still enjoyable to watch.

Overall, The Loud House is a fun and lively show with lots of humour and a bit of heart—perfect for a quick, entertaining watch.





If you like books with clever characters, a bit of chaos, and some really satisfying moments, *Matilda* is definitely worth reading. Written by Roald Dahl, it's one of those stories that's easy to get into and hard to forget.

The book is about Matilda Wormwood, who is basically a genius stuck in the worst possible family. Her parents don't care about books or learning at all, which makes it even more impressive that she teaches herself to read and ends up loving it. Honestly, it's kind of frustrating how badly they treat her, but it also makes you root for her even more.

When Matilda starts school, things get a bit better because she meets Miss Honey, who is probably one of the nicest teachers ever written. But then there's also Miss Trunchbull, who is the complete opposite. She's strict, scary, and completely over the top—it's almost funny how extreme she is, even though she's meant to be intimidating.

One of the best parts of the book is the humour. Dahl makes even the worst characters entertaining, and there are lots of moments that make you laugh or think, "They totally deserved that." The story also has a really satisfying sense of justice, which makes it fun to read.

At the same time, *Matilda* actually has a strong message. It shows that being smart and different isn't a bad thing, even if other people don't understand you. It also highlights how important it is to have someone who believes in you, like Miss Honey does for Matilda.

If I had to criticise anything, it's that some of the adults are so exaggerated that they don't feel very realistic—but that's kind of the point, and it adds to the humour.

Overall, *Matilda* is a really enjoyable and memorable book. It's funny, a bit rebellious, and has a great main character you can't help but support.



## Easter Egg Cookie Pops

### Ingredients

- 1 package of white chocolate chips
- 1 cup of cookies (homemade or store-bought)
- 1/2 cup of powdered sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon of salt
- Easter egg-shaped cookie decorations (optional)



### Instructions:

1. Melt the white chocolate chips in a microwave-safe bowl in 30-second increments, stirring between each interval, until smooth.
2. Crush the cookies into fine crumbs.
3. Dip the end of each cookie stick into the melted white chocolate, then roll the cookie crumb mixture around it to create a ball shape.
4. Place the balls on a parchment-lined baking sheet and refrigerate for 10-15 minutes to set.
5. If using Easter egg-shaped decorations, melt them according to package instructions and dip the top of each cookie pop into the melted decoration.
6. Let the cookie pops cool and harden before serving.



## Ham and Cheese Sliders

### Ingredients

- 1 pound ground beef
- 1/2 cup chopped cooked ham
- 1/4 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 8 hamburger buns
- Lettuce, tomato, pickles, and any other desired toppings



### Instructions:

1. Preheat grill or grill pan to medium-high heat.
2. In a bowl, combine ground beef, chopped ham, Worcestershire sauce, salt, and pepper. Mix well with your hands until just combined.
3. Divide mixture into 8 equal portions and shape each portion into a ball. Flatten slightly into patties.
4. Place patties on grill or grill pan and cook for 2-3 minutes per side, or until cooked through.
5. Assemble sliders by placing a cooked patty onto a bun, followed by shredded cheese and desired toppings.



## Chocolate Easter Bark

### Ingredients

- 1 cup white chocolate chips
- 1 cup milk chocolate chips
- 1/4 cup shredded coconut
- 1 tablespoon honey
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- Easter-themed sprinkles or sweets (optional)



### Instructions:

1. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper.
2. Melt the white chocolate chips in a microwave-safe bowl in 30-second increments, stirring between each interval, until smooth.
3. Pour the melted white chocolate onto the prepared baking sheet and spread evenly.
4. Sprinkle the shredded coconut, and honey over the white chocolate.
5. Melt the milk chocolate chips in a separate microwave-safe bowl, following the same instructions as before.
6. Drizzle the melted milk chocolate over the top of the bark.
7. If desired, add Easter-themed sprinkles or sweets on top.
8. Refrigerate for at least 30 minutes to set.
9. Break into pieces and serve.
