Recycling Workshop Inspires Pupils to Get Creative



Yesterday, Thornhill Park School held a special recycling workshop designed to help children understand the importance of reducing waste and reusing materials in imaginative ways. The whole day was full of creativity, teamwork and fun, as pupils discovered how ordinary objects that might usually be thrown away can be transformed into something useful and beautiful.

The day began with a recycling assembly, which brought the whole school together. Lydia Cave visited and spoke about the impact of rubbish on the environment and why recycling is such an important part of protecting the planet. Pupils learnt how recycling saves energy, reduces pollution and gives items a new life instead of letting them go to landfill. There was also time to share interesting facts and ask questions, which sparked great curiosity and set an enthusiastic tone for the rest of the day.

After the assembly, each class took part in a practical activity. Class 2 were especially busy with a project that turned empty plastic bottles into clever plant pots. The children carefully cut the bottles into shape, decorated them with colourful designs. Millie, who is in Class 1, joined the group and helped create her own pot. She was very proud of her work and enjoyed seeing how a simple bottle could be transformed into something completely different. The group was full of excitement as pupils compared their designs and imagined the flowers and herbs that might grow in their pots.

Later in the afternoon, Class 3 tackled a much larger recycling project. They worked with old car tyres, which at first looked heavy and dull, but were soon given a bright new look. Ben and Ocean, alongside Millie once again, took the lead in painting the tyres with bold, cheerful colours and patterns. By the end of the session, the tyres had been completely transformed into striking plant pots, perfect for adding character to the school garden. The children worked together brilliantly, encouraging one another and sharing ideas about how the finished pots could be arranged outdoors.

The atmosphere throughout the day was positive and inspiring. Pupils were not only having fun but also learning an important lesson: that waste materials are not useless, but can be reused in practical and creative ways.

This week sun class have enjoyed participating in different activities for Roald Dahl day. In art, the class made a scene from Charlie and the Chocolate Factory.

They also made a crocodile from The Enormous Crocodile. Students enjoyed listening to a range of stories through the week to celebrate the day.





This week, the pupils in Sun Class have been enthusiastically exploring the topic of the five senses as part of their science learning. To bring this learning to life in an engaging and practical way, the lesson was thoughtfully incorporated into their Forest School session.

During their time outside in the garden, the children were encouraged to focus closely on their surroundings and describe what they could hear, see, smell, and touch. Staff prompted them to use descriptive language as they shared their observations, helping to deepen their understanding of how we use our senses to experience the world around us.



As part of the activity, the students collected a range of natural items from the garden — such as leaves, twigs, petals, and small stones. These items were then creatively used in two different ways. First, they were arranged and attached to a large outline of a human body, helping the children make connections between the senses and the corresponding parts of the body.



Later in the day, the remaining natural materials were repurposed for a creative art session. Pupils used the collected leaves to paint and decorate beautiful silhouette artwork, using the shapes and textures of the foliage to inspire their designs. In addition, they crafted their very own magic confetti wands, carefully assembling sticks and leaves to create something imaginative and unique.

It was a wonderfully sensory experience that combined science, outdoor learning, and art, allowing the children to explore and express their learning in a hands-on and meaningful way.

Comet Class - Colour Hunt

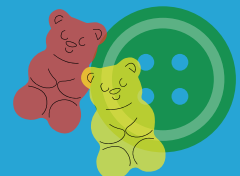
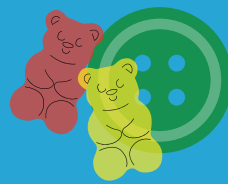

Cloud Class - Brush Brush Brush Our Teeth

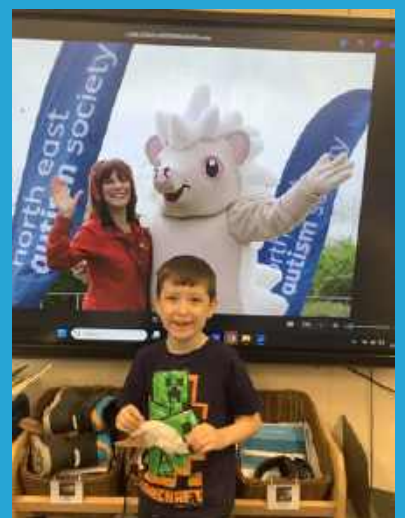

- Build confidence in sharing their ideas with others

Inspiring Young Minds Through Energy Futures Education

The Energy Futures programme ran by Alexandra Lawson and Rebecca provided learners with an engaging and informative experience, introducing them to the importance of sustainable energy and how it will shape the world of tomorrow. The session began at 9:30 and continued until 10:15 with an interactive introduction to the concept of Energy Futures. Learners took part in discussions and experiment-based activities that explored what energy is, where it comes from, and why renewable and sustainable energy sources are essential for the future. This interactive approach encouraged curiosity and active participation, helping learners build a strong understanding of key energy concepts.

From 10:30 to 11:15, learners explored the topic of hydrogen-powered cars through a hands-on investigation. They tested model cars on different surfaces to observe how friction and surface texture affect movement and energy efficiency. This practical activity allowed learners to make comparisons, share observations, and understand how scientific principles influence the design of future transport systems. The session highlighted hydrogen as a clean energy source and demonstrated how innovative technologies can help reduce environmental impact.



The programme concluded with the Energy Island group challenge from 11:15 to 12:00, where learners worked collaboratively to design an island powered entirely by sustainable energy sources. In groups, they discussed and selected suitable energy solutions such as solar, wind, and water power, considering factors like efficiency and environmental impact. Each group presented their ideas at the end of the session, showcasing their creativity, teamwork, and understanding of renewable energy. Overall, the Energy Futures programme successfully combined interactive learning, experimentation, and collaboration to inspire learners to think critically about sustainability and their role in shaping a cleaner energy future.

Police Visit Portland to Tackle Bullying

Pupils at Thornhill Park School's Portland site recently took part in an important and engaging visit from local police officers, who delivered a talk focused on bullying, respect, and staying safe both in and out of school.

The visit formed part of the school's ongoing commitment to promoting positive behaviour, wellbeing, and strong relationships within the school community. During the session, officers spoke openly with pupils about what bullying is, the different forms it can take, and the serious impact it can have on individuals' confidence, mental health, and sense of safety.

Using age-appropriate language and real-life examples, the officers explained the difference between friendship disagreements and bullying behaviour, helping pupils understand when and how to seek help. Particular attention was given to cyberbullying, highlighting how online actions can have real-world consequences and stressing the importance of thinking carefully before posting or sharing content.



The talk encouraged pupils to speak up if they experience or witness bullying, reassuring them that reporting concerns is the right thing to do. Officers outlined who pupils can turn to for support, including teachers, trusted adults, and family members, and reinforced the message that no one should feel afraid to ask for help.

Pupils were given the opportunity to ask questions, leading to thoughtful discussions about fairness, kindness, and personal responsibility. The interactive nature of the session helped pupils feel comfortable engaging with the officers and strengthened positive relationships between young people and the police.

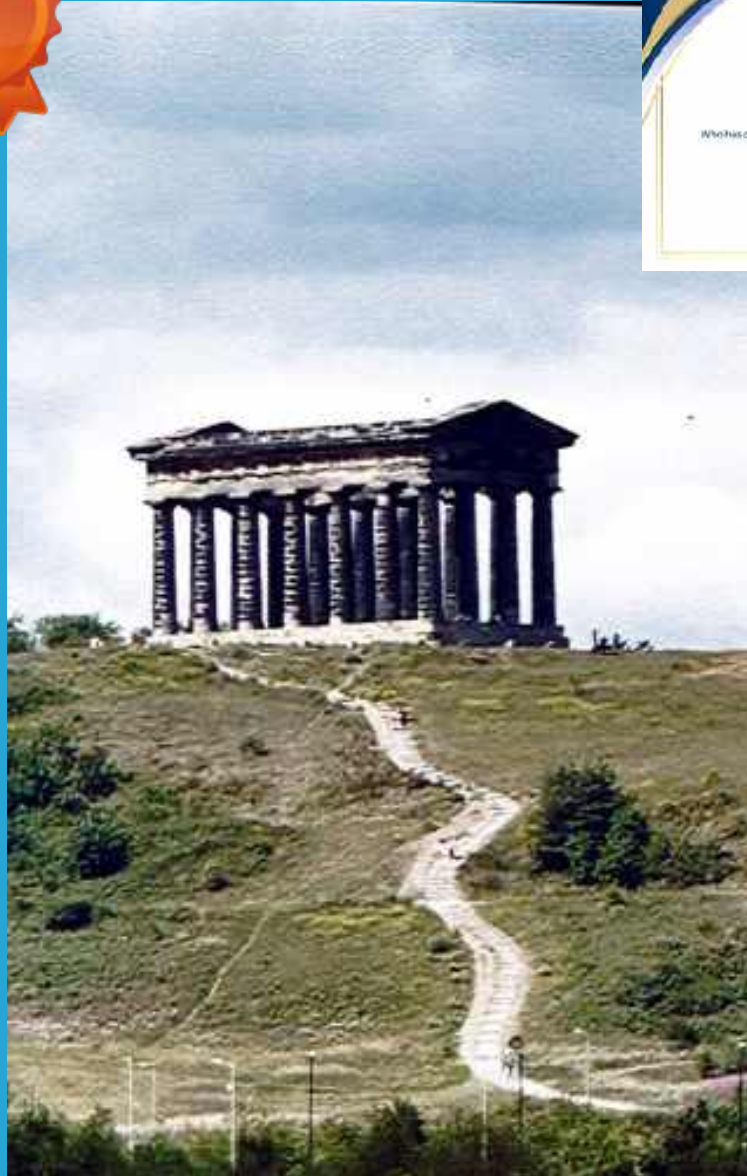

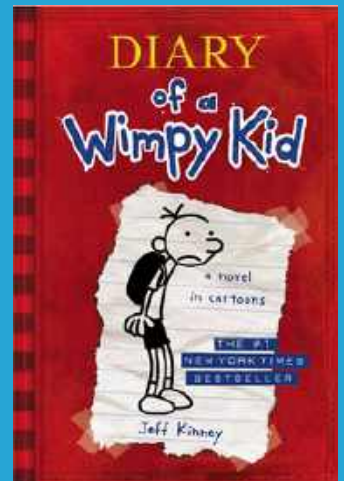

Gingerbread Men

Ingredients

- 350g/12oz plain flour, plus extra for rolling out
- 1 tsp bicarbonate of soda
- 2 tsp ground ginger
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- 125g/4½oz butter
- 175g/6oz light soft brown sugar
- 1 free-range egg
- 4 tbsp golden syrup

To decorate

- writing icing
- cake decorations



Method

1. Sift together the flour, bicarbonate of soda, ginger and cinnamon then pour into the bowl of a food processor. Add the butter and blend until the mix looks like breadcrumbs. Stir in the sugar.
2. Lightly beat the egg and golden syrup together, add to the food processor and pulse until the mixture clumps together. Tip the dough out, knead briefly until smooth, wrap in clingfilm and leave to chill in the fridge for 15 minutes.
3. Preheat the oven to 180C/350F/Gas 4.
4. Line two baking trays with greaseproof paper.
4. Roll the dough out to a 0.5cm/¼in thickness on a lightly floured surface. Using cutters, cut out the gingerbread men shapes and place on the baking tray, leaving a gap between them. For decorations, use a skewer to make a small hole in the top of each biscuit.
5. Bake for 12-15 minutes, or until lightly golden-brown. Leave on the tray for 10 minutes and then move to a wire rack to finish cooling. When cooled decorate with the writing icing and cake decorations.

Gluten-free Christmas cookies

Ingredients

- 125g/4½oz unsalted butter, at room temperature
- 125g/4½oz caster sugar
- ½ unwaxed lemon, zest only
- 1 free-range egg, lightly beaten
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 200g/7oz gluten-free plain flour, plus extra for rolling
- 40g/1½oz ground almonds
- ½ tsp xanthan gum
- pinch salt
- icing sugar, for dusting

Method

1. Mix together the softened butter and caster sugar in a bowl until pale and light. Add the lemon zest and mix again.
2. Scrape down the sides of the bowl with a rubber spatula, add the beaten egg and vanilla and mix again until thoroughly combined.
3. Add the gluten-free flour, ground almonds, xanthan gum and salt and mix until smooth. Bring the dough together into a neat ball using your hands, flatten into a disc, wrap in cling film and chill in the fridge for 1 hour.
4. Cover two baking trays with baking paper and lightly dust the work surface with gluten-free flour.
5. Roll the dough out to a thickness of 2–3mm/⅛in and, using the largest cutter stamp, cut out as many shapes from the dough as you can.
6. Arrange the cookies on the prepared baking trays and, using the smaller cutter, stamp out smaller stars from the middle of each biscuit. Gather the dough off-cuts into a ball and re-roll to make more shapes.
7. Chill the biscuits in the fridge for 30 minutes while you preheat the oven to 170C/150C Fan/Gas 3.
8. Bake on the middle shelf for about 10 minutes, or until the edge of each biscuit is lightly golden-brown. Leave to cool on the baking tray for about 2–3 minutes before transferring to a wire rack to cool completely.
9. Dust with icing sugar before serving.



Rudolph Reindeer Chocolate Crispy Cakes

Ingredients

- 150g dark chocolate
- 50g butter
- 2 Tbsp honey
- 120g rice crispy cereal

To decorate

- 24 pretzels
- 24 edible candy eyeballs
- 12 red smarties



Method

1. Line a 12 hole muffin tin with muffin cases.
2. Break the chocolate into chunks and place in a large microwave safe bowl.
3. Add the butter and honey to the bowl, then pop it into the microwave and heat in short bursts of around 30 seconds, stirring in between, until the chocolate has melted. Be careful not to overheat.
4. Stir well to completely combine the ingredients, then add the rice crispy cereal to the bowl.
5. Carefully mix together until the cereal is completely coated in the chocolate mixture.
6. Spoon the mixture into the muffin tin, dividing equally between the 12 cases.
7. Working quickly, decorate each crispy cake with 2 pretzels, 2 edible candy eyeballs and a red smartie, to make reindeer antlers, eyes and nose.
8. Once decorated, pop the crispy cakes in the fridge to chill for an hour or so until set.

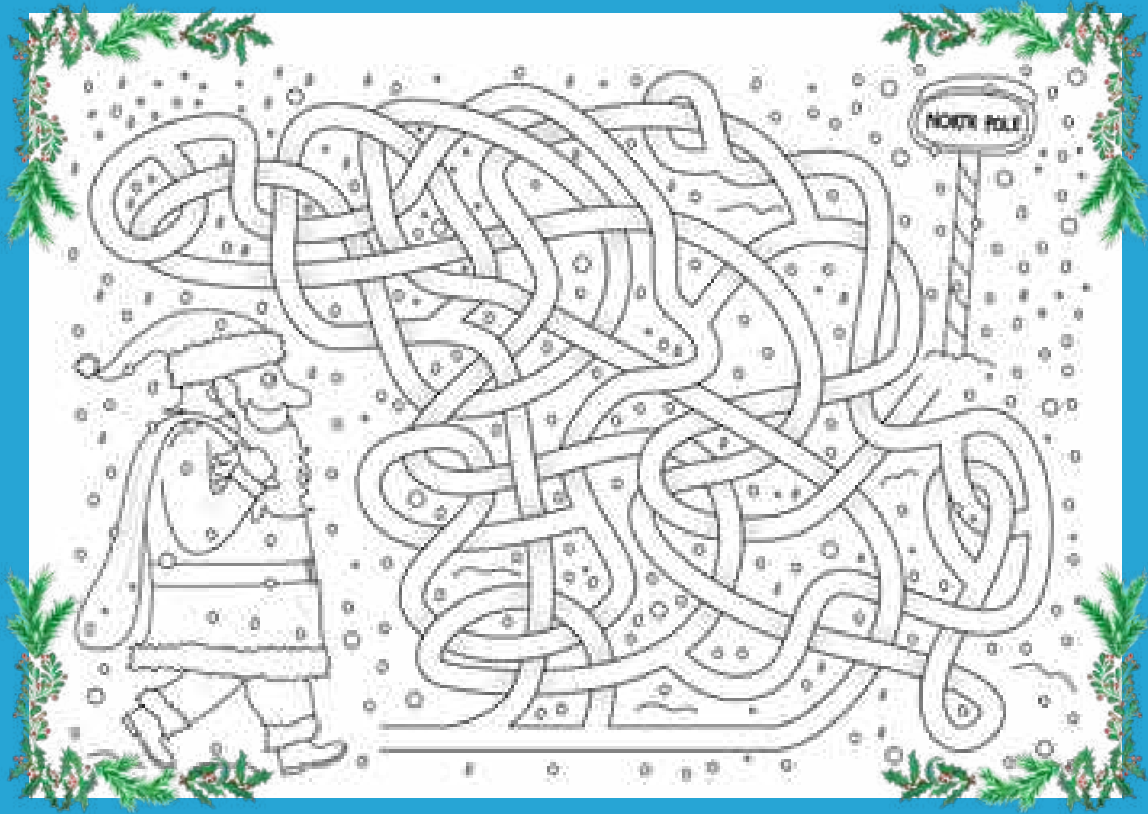
