African Music Comes Alive in Comet Class

This week in Topic, Comet Class have been exploring the continent of Africa through music and cultural learning. To begin the lesson, the children watched an informative slideshow which introduced them to Africa as a diverse continent made up of many different countries, each with its own unique cultures, traditions, languages and ways of life. The slideshow helped the pupils develop their understanding of Africa's rich heritage and geographical features.

Following this, the class watched a video showcasing musicians playing a variety of traditional African instruments, with a particular focus on different types of African drums. The children listened carefully to the rhythms and beats being created and discussed how music plays an important role in many African communities and celebrations.



After watching the video, the pupils took part in a hands-on practical activity where they were given the opportunity to explore and play a range of African-inspired musical instruments. These included drums, tambourines and shakers. The children spent time examining the instruments, discussing their appearance, how they produced sound and the different ways they could be played. They then experimented with creating their own rhythms and sounds, working both independently and alongside their peers.

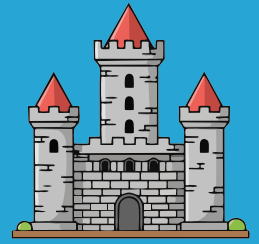

Cats, Caterpillars and Porridge!



This week in Phonics, Rainbow class learners have focused on the phonics sound “c” and the CVC word “cat.” Staff introduced the sound by exploring a range of toys and objects that begin with “c,” including a caterpillar. The learners enjoyed listening to and repeating the sound, as well as identifying other words that start with the same initial letter. They showed great engagement throughout the sessions and were keen to join in with the activities.

To further develop their understanding, the learners took part in a vet role-play activity where they cared for a toy cat. They enjoyed using the vet resources to check on the cat, make it comfortable, and help it feel better. This activity encouraged imaginative play, communication, and social interaction, while also reinforcing the focus word “cat.” The learners particularly enjoyed exploring the role-play area and demonstrated excellent engagement as they took on the role of vets.

Rainbow class have also been reading Goldilocks and the Three Bears every day before home time and have become increasingly familiar with the story, characters, and repeated phrases. The learners have enjoyed listening to the story and looking at the illustrations, with some learners beginning to anticipate what happens next.

To link with the story, on Friday during Life Skills the learners made their own porridge. They helped to prepare the ingredients and enjoyed exploring the texture, smell, and taste of the porridge once it was ready. This provided a valuable sensory experience and encouraged participation and independence. The learners were excited to try the porridge and made meaningful connections between the story and the activity, making it a fun and engaging end to the week.

Teen Drive Visit Inspires Future Drivers

When Teen Drive Sunderland visited our Emsworth site, learners had the opportunity to take part in an engaging and informative session led by Dan, who spoke about the journey into driving and what to expect as new drivers.

Dan delivered the session in a clear and approachable way, focusing on the key steps involved in learning to drive and building confidence behind the wheel. He spoke about the importance of developing good habits early, understanding the rules of the road, and taking the learning process seriously from the very beginning. His practical advice helped learners to see that driving is a skill that develops over time with patience and consistent effort.

A real highlight of the session was the enthusiasm shown by the learners, who asked a range of thoughtful questions throughout. They were keen to find out more about how driving lessons work, how long it can take to pass a test, and what they can do now to prepare. Dan answered each question in detail, offering realistic and encouraging guidance that helped to build learners' confidence and understanding.



The session also explored what learners can expect when starting lessons, including the importance of listening carefully to instructors, practising regularly, and staying focused during each session. Dan emphasised that everyone learns at a different pace, reassuring learners that progress is individual and that confidence will grow with experience.



Overall, the visit was a valuable experience that gave learners a clearer picture of the process of learning to drive. We would like to thank Dan and Teen Drive Sunderland for taking the time to speak with our learners and for delivering such a positive and informative session.

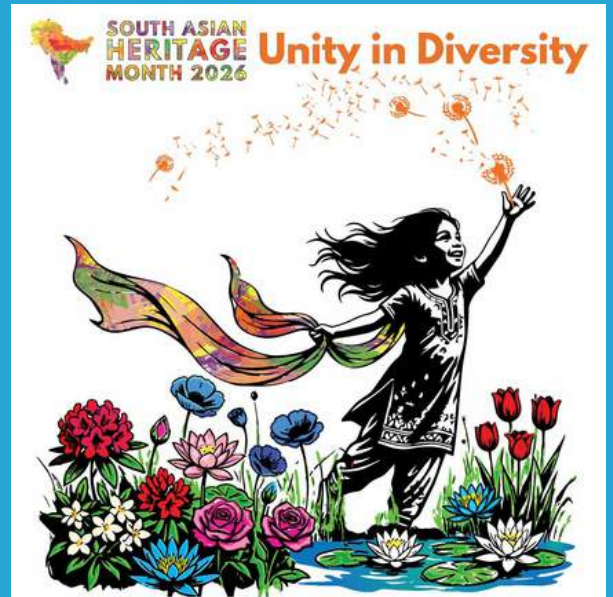
South Asian Heritage Month 2026 (18 July – 17 August)

This year's South Asian Heritage Month theme is "Unity in Diversity", reminding us that people can have different experiences of culture, language, religion, and tradition while still sharing communities, friendships and common values.

South Asia includes countries such as India, Pakistan, Bangladesh, Sri Lanka, Nepal, Bhutan, the Maldives and Afghanistan. Millions of people with South Asian heritage live across the UK, helping shape our schools, workplaces, neighbourhoods and culture.

Although these countries are often grouped together, they are incredibly diverse. More than 2,000 languages are spoken across South Asia. People follow many different religions, including Hinduism, Islam, Sikhism, Buddhism, Christianity, Jainism and others. Traditions, clothing, music, food and festivals can vary greatly, even between neighbouring towns!

The theme "Unity in Diversity" encourages us to avoid making assumptions about people based on where they or their family come from. Two people with South Asian heritage may have completely different backgrounds, beliefs or life experiences. The best way to learn about someone is to listen to their story rather than relying on stereotypes.



South Asian communities have made a lasting contribution to life in Britain. They have helped shape the NHS, education, science, engineering, business, sport, literature, politics and the arts. These achievements continue today, with people from South Asian backgrounds making a positive difference in every part of society.

Remember that there is no "typical" South Asian culture. Just as every person is unique, every person's identity is shaped by many different parts of who they are, including their family, interests, language, beliefs and experiences.

You can celebrate South Asian Heritage Month by:

- Learning about a South Asian country you know little about.
- Trying a new food or listening to music from a different culture.
- Reading a book or watching a film created by South Asian writers or filmmakers.
- Talking respectfully with others about their traditions and experiences.
- Challenging stereotypes when you hear them.

By celebrating our differences with curiosity and respect, we build stronger communities where everyone feels valued. That is what Unity in Diversity is all about.

International Youth Day (12 August)



Every year on 12th August, people around the world mark International Youth Day, a United Nations awareness day that celebrates young people and highlights the issues that matter to them.

We always say the children are the future of tomorrow, but they are also making differences today! Across the world, millions of young people volunteer in their communities, campaign for positive change, create new ideas, support others and speak up about issues that affect their lives.

International Youth Day is also a chance to recognise that many young people face challenges. These can include difficulties accessing education, finding employment, looking after their mental health, experiencing discrimination or having their voices overlooked when decisions are made. The day encourages governments, schools and communities to listen to young people and involve them in shaping the future.

- Listening respectfully to someone whose experiences are different from your own.
- Encouraging others to have their voices heard in a way that suits them.

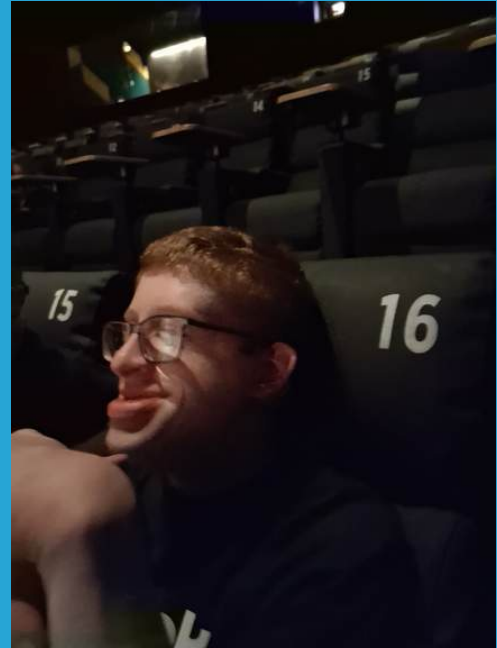

After spending 9 years at Thornhill Park School, it is now time for Ben to leave us.

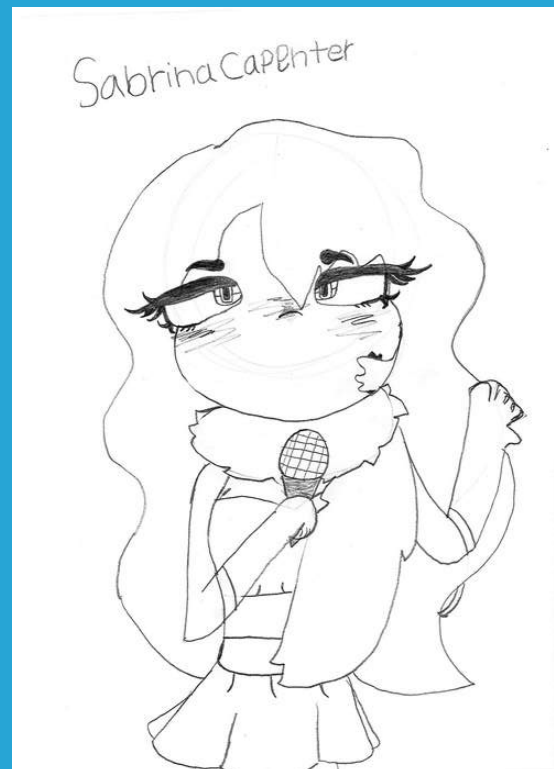

A Term of Fantastic Literacy Learning

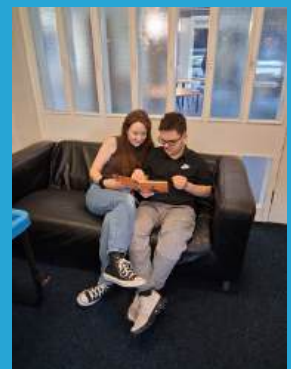

Making a Splash Safely: Summer Water Safety for Parents

The summer holidays are a wonderful time for families to enjoy days out at the beach, swimming pools, rivers and lakes. Water activities can be great fun and help children stay active, but it is important to remember that water can also present serious risks.

Parents and carers should always supervise children closely when they are near water, even if they are confident swimmers. Drowning can happen quickly and often without obvious signs of distress. Young children should remain within arm's reach of an adult at all times.

When visiting the coast, choose lifeguarded beaches where possible and pay attention to warning flags and safety signs. The sea can be unpredictable, with strong currents and rip tides that can easily catch out even experienced swimmers. Inland waterways such as rivers, canals and lakes can also be dangerous due to hidden obstacles, sudden drops in depth and cold water temperatures.

Children should be encouraged to wear suitable flotation devices during activities such as boating, kayaking or paddleboarding. However, parents should remember that inflatables are not a substitute for supervision and can quickly drift away in windy conditions.



Teaching children basic water safety skills is one of the best ways to protect them.

Swimming lessons can help build confidence and teach children how to stay safe in and around water. It is also important to discuss what to do in an emergency, including calling 999 and asking for the Coastguard at the coast if someone is in trouble.

Finally, don't forget general summer safety. Ensure children stay hydrated, wear sunscreen and take regular breaks from the sun, especially during hot weather.

By staying vigilant, understanding the risks and encouraging safe behaviour, families can enjoy the UK's waterways and coastlines safely throughout the summer holidays. A little preparation and awareness can help ensure that every day out by the water is both enjoyable and safe.

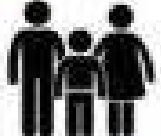

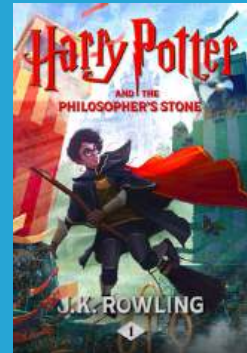
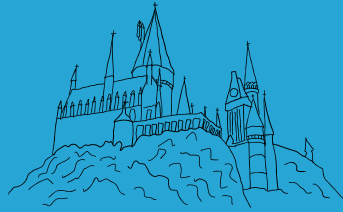


Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone

Rainbow Fruit Salad Jars

Ingredients

- 350g natural yogurt
- 1 Tbsp honey (optional)
- 100g green grapes
- 2 kiwi fruits
- ½ 400g tin apricot halves in light syrup
- 2 easy peel oranges
- 8 medium sized strawberries
- 100g fresh blueberries



Instructions:

1. Mix the yogurt with the honey, then divide between the 4 jars, carefully spooning into the bottom of each jar and avoiding dripping it down the sides if possible.
2. Prepare the fruit - wash and halve the green grapes, peel and roughly chop the kiwi fruits, roughly chop 4 apricot halves (reserve the syrup), peel and break the oranges into segments, wash, hull and roughly chop the strawberries, wash the blueberries.
3. Carefully divide the fruit between the 4 jars, layering in rainbow order - the order I used was kiwi, green grapes, apricot, orange segments, strawberries and blueberries.
4. Drizzle a spoonful of the reserved syrup from the tinned apricots over the fruit in each jar and serve immediately.



Pizza Pockets

Ingredients

- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 1 large garlic clove, crushed
- 1 tsp dried oregano
- 400g tin chopped tomatoes
- 2 x 400g packs pre-rolled pizza dough, or 2 x 375g packs ready-rolled puff pastry
- 150g/5½oz mix of grated mozzarella and cheddar
- 1 free-range egg, beaten
- For the pepperoni filling
- 16 slices pepperoni, halved (2 slices per pocket)
- For the ham and pineapple filling
- 4 large slices ham, chopped
- 227g tin pineapple slices, drained and chopped
- For the vegetarian filling
- 1 small red pepper, seeded and thinly sliced
- 80g/2¾oz sweetcorn (tinned is fine)



Instructions:

1. Heat the oil in a pan over a medium heat, add the garlic and oregano and cook for 30 seconds, until fragrant. Add the tomatoes and simmer for 10–15 minutes until thickened, stirring from time to time and breaking up the lumps of tomato. Leave to cool.
2. Unroll the pizza dough (or pastry) and divide each piece into four. Put a spoonful of the tomato sauce on one half of each of the eight pieces of dough. Add your chosen filling, then the cheese. Brush the edges of the dough with beaten egg, then fold the uncovered side over the filling. Press the edges together and crimp with a fork to seal.
3. Chill in the fridge for 30 minutes. Preheat the oven to 200C/180C Fan/Gas 6.
4. Bake the pizza pockets for 20 minutes, until golden and puffed. Leave to cool for 5 minutes before tucking in.

Lemon School Cake

Ingredients

- 225g/8oz butter, softened, plus extra for greasing
- 225g/8oz caster sugar
- 250g/9oz self-raising flour
- 4 free-range eggs
- 3 tbsp milk
- 2 lemons, finely grated zest and juice
- pinch salt
- 200g/7oz-300g/10½oz icing sugar
- multi-coloured sprinkles, to decorate



Instructions:

1. Preheat the oven to 180C/160C Fan/Gas
2. Using an electric whisk, beat together the butter, caster sugar, flour, eggs, milk, lemon zest and salt in a large bowl until smooth and creamy.
3. Spread the mixture in the tin, levelling off the surface with the back of a spoon.
4. Bake for 25–30 minutes until golden and springy. Leave to cool in the tin for a few minutes then carefully remove the paper and leave to cool completely on a wire rack.
5. Mix together the icing sugar and enough lemon juice to make a pourable icing.
6. Spread the icing over the cooled cake, scatter over some sprinkles and leave to set before cutting into squares.

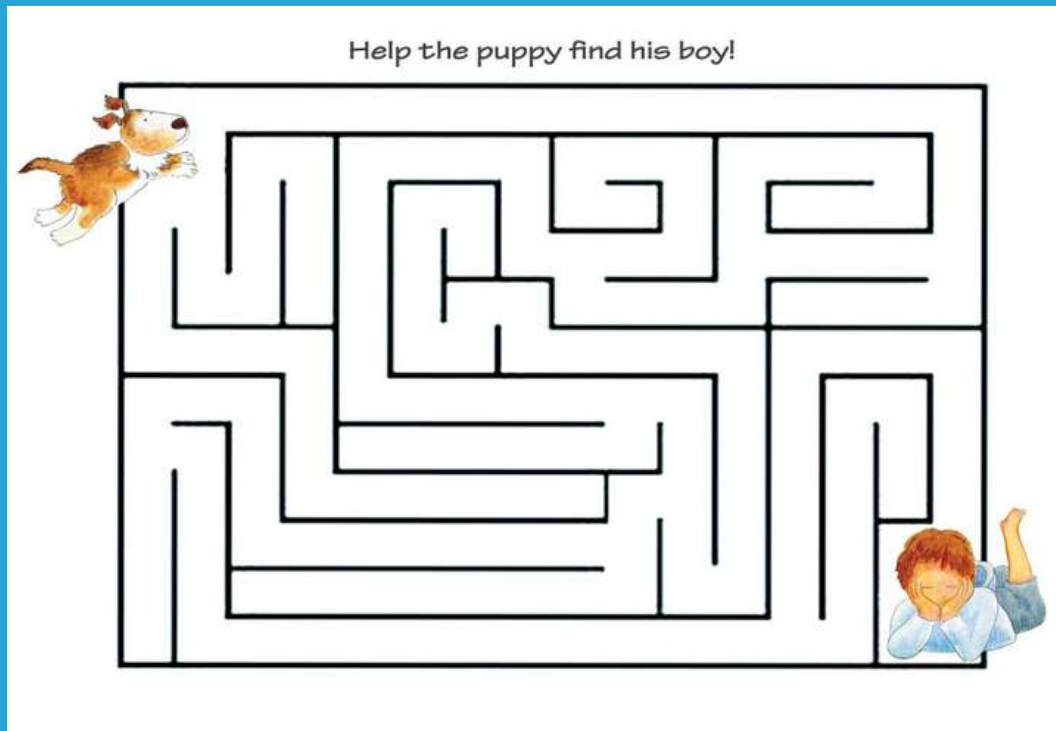
